## Kiddush L'vana

The molad of Sivan is on Friday (June 7th - last week had the wrong date), 25 minutes and 9 chalakim (parts) after midnight. This 'translates' to 1:03am Israel Summer Time.

First opportunity for Kiddush L'vana according to Minhag Yerushalayim is three full days after the molad.

For this month, that will be Monday night (June 10th).

It is a very common custom to wait until after Shavuot and say KL on Motza'ei Yom Tov. Minhag Yerushalayim does not wait - neither for Shavuot in Sivan, nor until after Yom Kippur in Tishrei, nor after Tish'a b'Av in Av. That minhag always takes the first opportunity, weather-permitting. But not on a Friday night or Leil Yom Tov - unless it is the last opportunity to say KL.

For the opinion that KL is after 7 days following the molad, the first opportunity will be Motza'ei Shabbat of Parshat Naso, June 15th.

## Days of the week for Shavuot

Shavuot always falls on the day of the week following the day on which Pesach begins. In the AT-BASH mnemonic for days of the week, BET is paired with SHIN, meaning the second day of Pesach and Shavuot are on the same day of the week.

Because Pesach is LO B'DU, not on a Monday, Wednesday, or Friday, Shavuot then is LO G'HaZ (GIMEL-HEI-ZAYIN), not on a Tuesday, Thursday, or Shabbat.

Shavuot can fall on a Sunday, Monday, Wednesday, or Friday.

The most frequent day for Shavuot in our current fixed calendar is Wednesday (like this year), 31.89% of years.

Next is Friday (28.57%) and Sunday (28.03%). And least frequent is Monday occurring only 11.51% of the years.
