KIDDUSH L'VANA

The molad of Menachem Av, in clock time, was Tuesday, July 14th, at 8:16pm Israel Summer Time.

According to Minhag Yerushalayim, Kiddush L'vana can be said three full days after the molad - unless it falls on Leil Shabbat, in which case, first opportunity for KL is Motza'ei Shabbat.

So, according to Minhag Yerushalayim, one should say KL this Motza'ei Shabbat Chazon - July 18th.

Those who wait for seven days after the molad will have their first op for KL on Tuesday, July 21st.

HOWEVER...

There is a long-time custom to wait until after Tish'a b'Av for KL of Av, until after Yom Kippur for KL of Tishrei, and after Shavuot for KL of Sivan.

So many will say KL after Tish'a b'Av - preferably after breaking one's fast (but not required).

Others will wait until Motza'ei Shabbat Nachamu - July 25th.

ONE THE OTHER HAND...

Minhag Yerushalayim holds that one should always take the first opportunity for KL (except for Leil Shabbat or Yom Tov) - even during Tishrei, Sivan, and Av.

And so, to repeat - according to Minhag Yerushalayim (based on the opinions of the Vilna Gaon), one should say KL this Motza'ei Shabbat Chazon - July 18th.

Shabbat Chazon

But here's let's do the CALstats.

This year, Shabbat Chazon is the 4th of Av. This happens 28.57% of years - that's twice in seven years, on average, although the occurrences are not evenly distributed.

Some years, Chazon is on the 6th of the month - a frequency of 31.89%.

Some years, Chazon is Erev Tish'a b'Av. It happens 28.03% of the time.

And, less frequently, Shabbat Chazon is on the ninth of Av. In which case, Shabbat bumps the fast of Tish'a b'Av to Sunday. That happens only 11.51% of the time.
